- 5 Major Incidents
 - Definition: 911/SAR and/or hospitalization
- 11 Significant Incidents
 - Definition: Injury & Dr. visit, no 911/SAR
- 73 Minor Incidents
 - Definition: No Dr. visit

Request of Trip Leaders



- Please use "Incident Reporting" section in <u>Activity Report</u> to document <u>all</u> incidents
 - As soon as possible after trip
 - Also include no-injury "near-misses"
- Any information is better than nothing
- This is principal source of information for our reports
- We will follow up if we need more

- SAR, helo evacuation

2. Broken Ankle & Leg

5-1-10

- Spire Rock, unroped traverse
- 911

3. Broken Neck

5-14-10

- Baker Lodge, child fell from top bunk
- 911, hospitalization

4. Broken Ankle

5-16-10

- Mt. Erie, climb, leader fall
- SAR

5. Broken Ankle

6-20-10

- Royal Columns, Tieton, Climb
- Leader fall
- SAR

Significant Incidents (11)

(Injury and Dr. visit, but no SAR)



Fall during self-arrest practice
Slip/Trip/Falls on non-technical terrain:
Fall on trail
Fall on snow
Kicked back of leg
Fell off log

Cut finger on rock

Significant Incident Injuries



- Torn bicep muscle in shoulder
- Deep gash in leg
- Broken finger
- Broken shoulder
- Broken wrist
- Crampon puncture of leg
- Tendon tear in knee
- Fractured fibula
- Sprained ankle
- Sliced finger
- Broken rib

Significant Incidents



- Two Significant Incidents occurred on organized Field Trips
 - Scramble
 - Intermediate Ice

Minor Incidents (No Dr. visit)



- 73 incidents reported
 - Likely under-reported, but improving as Leaders learn of our interest

Minor Incidents



- Fall 28
 - Fall during glissade 1
 - Fall on non technical terrain 16
 - Fall on rock (roped) 1
 - Fall on snow 10
- Hit/Cut 4
 - Cut by equipment 3
 - Hit by falling object 1

Minor Incidents (Cont.)



- Illness 18
 - Altitude sickness 2
 - Blisters 4
 - Cramping 1
 - Feeling weak 2
 - Heat exhaustion 2
 - Hypothermia 1
 - Knees / ankles- 3
 - Previous injury 3

Minor Incidents (Cont.)



- Kayaking 3
 - Kayaking other 1
 - Kayaking weather 2
- Logistics 6
 - Party Separation 5
 - Routefinding 1
- Preparation 2
 - Conditioning 2
- Other 12
 - Informational 10
 - Route warning 2



Recommendations Categories

- Leading Rock
- Slips, trips and falls
- Equipment



Learning to Lead Rock

- Students should practice well within their ability
- Students should practice where fall is unlikely to cause injury
- Sew up the route

Slips, Trips and Falls



- Very common on non-technical terrain
- Special emphasis: be careful on descent
- Avoidance
 - Be aware of risks
 - Wet rock
 - Moss
 - Bark on logs & wet logs
 - Could use trekking poles for balance

Electronics & Equipment



- Know how to use
- Understand limitations
- Batteries
 - Keep warm in winter
 - Be sure fresh and/or charged

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A-1. 2006 Major Incidents



- Fall on snow w/ice ax arrest failure
 - 1. Cracked pelvis & vertebrae Crosby Mtn
 - 2. Lacerated knee, bruised ribs The Brothers
- Steep snow travel w/o ice ax
 - 3. Broken leg McClellan Butte
 - 4. Lacerated head High Priest
- Uncontrolled Glissade
 - 5. Lacer. face, abdominal puncture Red Mtn

2006 Major Incidents



- Rock Leader Fall
 - 6. Bruising, chipped vertebrae Chair Peak
- Unroped Fall
 - 7. Possibly caused by stroke broken leg, back, neck, fatality by blood clot 3 weeks later Yellowjacket Tower
 - 8. Concussion, ankle and wrist injury Lundin Peak



2006 Major Incidents

- Party separation
 - 9. Solo unplanned bivy (2 nights)
 - -- Hypothermia, dehydration and frostbite
 - -- Muncaster Mountain



A-2. 2007 Major Incident

- Hike on Mt. Jupiter
 - Fatality
 - "Congenital Coronary Artery Hypoplasia"

A-3. 2008 Major Incidents



- 1. Fractured Hip (hospitalized)
 - Magnuson Park Clubhouse ladder fall
- 2. Fractured Leg (SAR, hospitalized)
 - Suntop Road ski tip caught
- 3. Fractured Leg (SAR, hospitalized)
 - Mt. Baring arrest failure, 150' slide

A-4. 2009 Major Incidents

1. Hip Hematoma

Tacoma Clubhouse – step thru ceiling

2. Deep abdominal cut + Other

McClellan Butte, Climb – loose boulder

3. Fractured Ankle

Camp Muir, Scramble – snowshoe fall/slide

4. Deep Leg Gash

Icicle Ridge, Hike (Singles) – fall from log

2009 Major Incidents

5. Lost Overnite

- Kaleetan Peak, Scramble
- Member separated from party
 - Chose "better route"

6. Felt Faint

- Foss Waterway, Sea Kayaking
- Wilderness First Aid event

7. Panic Attack

Tacoma Clubhouse, MOFA class



A-5. Club Wide Safety Committee

- Reports to Board of Trustees
- Established after Sharkfin Tower Accident
- Promote a culture of safety in The Mountaineers
 - Collect/report accidents and nearmisses
 - Educate our leaders and instructors
