#### **CLIMBING ROCK DEFEATED**

Climbing rock committee chairman Jim Eychaner has announced that he has withdrawn the proposal sent to the City of Everett.

The major problem was the insistence of City attorneys that the City be named a co-insured on The Mountaineers' general liability insurance policy. This was deemed impossible by the club's insurance broker.

The fact is that the rock was defeated by people who have abused the insurance industry and the legal system. Publicity about major liability claims and court awards have created an atmosphere of doubt and mistrust that prevents progress on anything that even appears to present a risk to the public.

Jim worked on the project for over two and a half years, with great support from John Jones and Steve Kieffer.

# 1987 INTERMEDIATE MOUNTAINEERING CLASS

For those who want MORE, consider signing up for the tenth consecutive Everett Mountaineers' Intermediate Mountaineering Course. Course contents will include advanced techniques in fifth class rock, ice climbing, and winter mountaineering. Major emphasis will be placed on developing the true alpinist as an individual and team member, competent to lead high angle rock and ice climbs and able to adapt and be compatible with the wilderness environment.

## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

- A. Entrance Requirements
  - 1. Member of Mountaineers
  - 2. Basic graduate or equivalency
  - 3. Climbing committee approval
- B. First Year Requirements
  - 1. MOFA first-aid certificate
  - 2. Complete all intermediate lectures
  - 3. Complete all intermediate field trips
- C. Requirements for Graduation (complete within five years)
  - Participate in two basic field trips one rock oriented and one snow oriented
  - 2. Lead one club climb
  - 3. Participate in three technical rock climbs
  - 4. Participate in two technical ice climbs
  - 5. Participate in three winter climbs, one overnight
  - 6. Maintain a current MOFA card
  - 7. Petition the climbing committee for graduation
