

#### NEW ROPE POLICY

The Everett Mountaineers Climbing Committee has adopted a new policy for the use of ropes. This new policy limits the use of club ropes to "official" club climbs. reason for this new policy is obvious when one considers the liability problems which could result from the continued lending of ropes personal climbs. After a lengthy discussion during the May of the Everett Mounmeeting taineers, it became apparent that term "official" club climb needs clarification. In order for a climb to be "official" it must be approved by the Climbing Committee Chair (Dan Morse), or by the Coordinator of the Intermediate Climbing Class (Jack Bennett), or the Climbing Committee Records Chair (Dianne Duffy).

To be approved by the Climbing Committee Chair, or the other designated members of the Climbing Committee, the climb must meet the following criteria:

- 1. The leader must be a recognized leader of Everett Mountaineer climbs, as indicated on the most recent Climb Leader List.
- The climb must be in full 2. accordance with the Climbing Code. Mountaineers Everett recognized those individuals listed on the Climb Leader List as leaders which have demonstrated good judgement. That is, they follow the precepts of safe mountaineering as set forth by the climbing code. will be assumed that those leaders listed on the current Climb Leader List are upholding the precepts of safe mountaineering, unless otherwise demonstrated.

It is not necessary for a climb to be published in the bulletin to be "official"; but the climb must be approved. To have a climb approved, contact one of the people designated above. That person will then contact the rope steward with

your request. Please plan your climbs a week or more in advance to allow time for the necessary contacts to be made.

The new Climb Leader List will be published the first week of June. It will be mailed to each leader on the list. If you would like a copy and you are not on the Climb Leader List, or a student of the Basic Climbing Class, contact me at 353-6643. Leave your name and address and I will send you the Climb Leader List when it is published. Your support of this new policy is appreciated! Wishing you a safe and enjoyable Summer filled with climbs.





#### RULES GOVERNING THE EVERETT BRANCH OF THE MOUNTAINEERS

Pursuant to Article XI of the By-laws of the Mountaineers, the following are adopted.

#### ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this organization shall be: The Mountaineers, Everett Branch.

#### ARTICLE II. OBJECT

The object of this branch is to make it possible for club members in the Everett area to carry out locally the purposes of the Mountaineers.

#### ARTICLE III, MEMERERSHIP

<u>Section 1:</u> Members of the Mountaineers shall become members of the Everett Branch upon application to the Branch.

Section 2: Classification of members shall be in accord with Article II, Membership, of the By-laws of the Mountaineers.

#### ARTICLE IV. OFFICERS

Section 1: The elective officers shall be a Branch Chair, a Vice Branch Chair, a Secretary, a Treasurer and a Trustee. These officers shall perform the duties prescribed by these rules.

Section 2: New officers shall assume office at the end of the meeting at which they are elected and serve through the following Annual Meeting, or until their successors shall be elected and qualified.

# ARTICLE V. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1: The Branch Chair shall preside at all regular and special meetings and appoint all committee chairs who shall report all committee members to the Branch Chair. The Branch Chair shall be the spokesperson for the Branch.

Section 2: The Vice Branch Chair shall act in place of the Branch Chair in her/his absence, and during the Branch Chair's absence shall have all her/his powers and duties.

<u>Section 3:</u> The Secretary shall be the recording officer of this organization. The Secretary shall in the absence of both the Branch Chair and Vice Branch Chair have all the powers and duties of the presiding officer.

Section 4: The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all monies of the organization and make monthly and annual reports.

Section 5: The Trustee, in addition to the duties set forth in Article III of the By-laws of the Mountaineers, shall represent the Everett Branch at the meetings of the Board of Trustees and report to the membership on the proceedings of the Board.

#### ARTICLE VI, ELECTIONS

<u>Section 1:</u> A nominating committee of not less than three (3) members shall be appointed by the Branch Chair at the regular June meeting each year.

Section 2: The Nominating Committee shall present the nominations at the August regular Branch meeting. Nominations from the floor will also be accepted at the August regular Branch meeting. This committee shall also submit the election ballot with the nominations and provisions for write-in candidates to the Branch membership. Balloting may be either by mail-in or at the Annual Meeting.

Section 3: All ballots mailed-in must be received by 5 P.M. on the day of the Annual Meeting. Ballots cast at the Annual Meeting shall be accepted until 9:00 P.M. or until one-half (1/2) hour after the end of the Annual Meeting whichever is later. The ballots shall be turned over to a special tellers committee previously appointed by the Branch Chair of which the Secretary shall be chair. The committee shall count the ballots immediately and submit a written report of the results of the vote to the Branch Chair. The results shall be reported to the members by announcement in the Club bulletin, Branch newsletter or other means.

Section 4: A permanent vacancy in any office shall be filled by special election with nominations from the floor. The special election shall be announced by the Acting Branch Chair during a regular meeting and shall be held during the next regular meeting. A vacancy shall be deemed permanent by reason of resignation, death, or three (3) months absence from active duty.

#### ARTICLE VII, MEETINGS

<u>Section 1:</u> This organization shall hold a regular meeting the first Wednesday of each month except December.

Section 2: The September meeting shall be the Annual Meeting.

<u>Section 3:</u> Special meetings may be called at the discretion of the Branch Chair. Due notice of such meetings, at least 15 days in advance, shall be sent to the membership.

Section 4: Thirty (30) voting members shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5: The fiscal year shall extend from October 1 to September 30 of the following calendar year.

# ARTICLE VIII, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

<u>Section 1:</u> There shall be an Executive Committee composed of the officers and chairs of all standing committees. The retiring Branch Chair, for one year after her/his term as Branch Chair, shall be an <u>ex officio</u> member of this committee. The Branch Chair shall preside at the meetings of the Executive Committee.

#### ARTICLE IX, COMMITTEES AND DUTIES

Section 1: The Branch Chair shall appoint the chairs of the following standing committees: Alpine Scramblers, Climbing, Communications, Conservation, Explorer Scout Post, Folkdance, Hiking, Membership, Skiing and Social. Each committee shall consist of at least three (3) members.

Section 1.1: The Alpine Scramblers Committee shall schedule all scrambles and may conduct an alpine scrambling course. They shall maintain records of the achievements of members in alpine scrambling activities of the organization.

Section 1.2: The Climbing Committee shall schedule all climbs, and may conduct mountaineering courses. They shall determine and enforce safe mountaineering practices and be responsible for all the climbing properties of the organization. They shall maintain records of the achievements of members in climbing activities of the organization.

Section 1.3: The Communications Committee shall be in charge of all publicity, shall maintain a record book for the organization and may publish a Branch newsletter.

Section 1.4: The Conservation Committee shall investigate conservation issues, report on them to the Branch and strive to preserve through protective legislation and encouragement the natural beauty and bounty of nature and the Northwest. The Conservation Committee shall, upon approval of the Branch Chair, prepare positions representing Branch policy on conservation issues and address these positions to appropriate entitles.

Section 1.5: The Explorer Scout Post Committee may sponsor an Explorer Scout Post (Boy Scouts of America Post #16) which will be open to all Junior Mountaineers registered with the Branch. They may conduct an alpine scrambling level program as the post activity, and supervise and conduct alpine scrambling level Explorer Scout Post activities. Explorer Scout Post functions will be coordinated with and reviewed by the Climbing and Alpine Scramblers Committees. They shall maintain records of the achievements of members in Explorer Scout Post activities of the organization.

Section 1.6: The Folkdance Committee shall schedule all folkdances and may conduct folkdance courses. They shall maintain records of the achievements of members in folkdance activities of the organization.

Section 1.7: The Hiking Committee shall schedule all trail trips and may conduct a backpacking course. They shall maintain records of the achievements of members in trail trip activities of the organization.

Section 1.8: The Membership Committee shall pass on all applications for membership in the organization. They shall be responsible for receiving and welcoming new members to the meetings and shall keep a current membership list.

Section 1.9 The Skiing Committee shall schedule all ski trips and may conduct skiing courses. They shall maintain records of the achievements of members in skiing activities of the organization.

Section 1.10: The Social Committee shall have charge of all social functions of the organization.

Section 2: A special auditing committee is to be appointed by the Branch Chair at the Annual Meeting for the purpose of auditing the books of account for the fiscal year ending the past September 30. Other special committees may be appointed at the discretion of the Branch Chair.

Section 3: All standing committee chairs shall submit all records and a report covering the fiscal year's activities to the new Secretary at the Annual Meeting, who will then turn them over to the new committee chairs when appointed.

Section 4: All committees shall continue to function through the Annual Meeting.

#### ARTICLE X. RULES OF ORDER

Section 1: The rules contained in the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall govern this organization in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the rules, By-laws or the Special Rules of Order of this organization.

#### ARTICLE XI, AMENDMENTS

Section 1: Any member of the Everett Branch may submit to the Branch Chair a proposed amendment to the Rules. The Branch Chair shall appoint a Rules Committee to consider the form of the proposed amendment. The Rules Committee will consult with the sponsor and Branch Chair, and attempt to reach an agreement with the sponsor as to the form of the amendment.

Section 2: The Rules Committee shall submit the proposed amendment to the membership at the next regular Branch meeting. If the proposed amendment is endorsed by a majority of the voting Branch membership at that regular Branch meeting, the Rules Committee shall submit the proposed amendment as a written ballot to the voting Branch membership. Balloting may be either by mail-in or at the following regular Branch meeting (Balloting Meeting).

Section 3: All ballots mailed-in must be received by 5 P.M. on the day of the Balloting Meeting. Ballots cast at the Balloting Meeting shall be accepted until 9:00 P.M. or until one-half (1/2) hour after the end of the Balloting Meeting whichever is later. The ballots shall be turned over to a special tellers committee previously appointed by the Branch Chair of which the Secretary shall be chair. The committee shall count the ballots immediately and submit a written report of the results of the vote to the Branch Chair. The results shall be reported to the members by announcement in the Club bulletin, Branch newsletter or other means.

Section 4: In order for the amendment to pass, it must receive a two-thirds (2/3rds) affirmative vote of the total vote cast.
