• Trustees Report

Next Meeting, Wed. Jan. 6

At the November Everett Branch meeting, I presented a desire by the Board of Trustees to increase the annual dues. This led to a lively discussion about where our money goes and why an increase is necessary. I did my best to relate information, however a lot of questions and concerns seemed to go unanswered. We are planning on having our President, Bill Maxwell, attend a Branch meeting to talk to us.

Our regular membership meeting starts at 7:30 p.m. at the First Congregational Church, at Everett and Rockefeller. The President of The Mountaineers, Bill Maxwell, will be present to answer questions from the Everett Branch members about the present status of The Mountaineers. Questions about the future direction of the club by the Board of Trustees will also be welcome. The program, "Photo Safari in Africa," will be presented by Caroline Bonamy and will feature a climb of Kilimanjaro.

At the November Board of Trustess meeting the Board voted to increase the annual dues by \$7.00 to \$34.00. Initiation fees would remain at \$27.00. I presented our viewpoints and concerns, and asked that a dues increase be delayed until these issues could be studied in depth. The Board felt it is necessary to balance the budget now. A Dues and Fees Committee, which will include branch members, will soon start a comprehensive study. Starting next year it should be possible to charge your dues with Visa or MasterCard.

Snowshoe Seminar

Learn the basics of snowshoeing. Dorothy Beeman will present the in's and out's of this winter sport. A field trip is offered on Saturday, Jan. 23 at Stevens Pass Lodge at 10:00 a.m. Participants need not stay at the lodge to participate. According to Mountaineer By-laws, any member who has been a regular or spouse dues paying member for at least 10 years and who has reached the age of 65 years or more may apply for Senior membership. They shall pay 40% of regular member dues, rounded to the nearest dollar.

1988 Basic Climbing Course

Everett's Basic Climbing Course is scheduled to begin on Feb. 23, 1988, with an evening that will offer an orientation and overview of the course and its requirements prior to registration.

This and all lectures will be held at Legion Hall, located in Legion Park in north Everett, on Fourth Street and Alverson Boulevard (next to the golf course). All lectures begin at 7:00 p.m.

The purpose of the course is to teach the fundamentals of rock, snow, and glacier climbing with emphasis on safe mountain travel. Course requirements include attendance at all lectures, satisfactory completion of all field trips, passing a final exam, and successful participation on three climbs, including at least one rock and one glacier climb. Also required for graduation is a current Mountaineering Oriented First Aid (MOFA) card; a course is offered in conjunction with this program (described in this newsletter) which will fulfill this requirement.

The fee is \$50.00 for members and \$75.00 for non-members. While non-members may take the course, only Mountaineer members may participate on Mountaineer climbs and will receive a certificate of graduation upon successful completion of the course. Class size limited to sixty-five (65) participants.

Management Plan
for
North Cascades National Park

Your comments on the proposed North Cascades National Park Management Plan are needed before January 8, 1988. This has turned into a hot political issue with the Park's Superintendent needing more support than he is getting for his management strategies. Many of his plans for the park are considered favorable with the Conservation Division and need to be addressed as such in comments from our membership.

Below are some of the Division's recommendations for comment. You are encouraged to elaborate on those areas that you are familiar with.

1. The following areas are recommended for addition to the park: Thunder, Thornton and Damnation Creeks, Big Beaver Valley, and Ruby Mountain. All but Thornton and Damnation Creeks are now in the Ross Lake National Recreation Areas. These areas were left out of the park originally because Seattle City Light wanted to retain them for possible hydroelectric development. Inclusion in the park would protect them from such development.

2. The wild character of the park should be preserved and the natural values of the park's ecosystem protected. There is presently pressure being placed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife to artificially stock high mountain lakes. This is viewed as disruption of the natural ecosystem in these alpine areas.

In addition, wilderness designation is recommended for all of the park, most of Lake Chelan National Recreation area and lands down to 25 feet above Ross Lake.

(The above items are part of the Superintendent's plan now needing support.)

3. The Park Service is considering additional development in Stehekin. Any substantial added development should be opposed.

4. The Park Service should study the Skagit River from Bacon Creek to Gorge Dam for "scenic" status. Furthermore, they should study Ruby Canyon, Granite, Panther and Thunder Creeks, and the Stehekin River for "Wild and Scenic" river designation.
