The Everett Mountaineers are proud to recognize Don Heck as the President of the Mountaineers. Don holds the distinction of becoming the first branch member to serve as president of the entire club and Everett is honored to claim him as one of ours.

Don has been an active Mountaineer member since joining the Everett Branch in 1979 when he enrolled as a student in the Everett Basic Climbing Course. Since that time, Don's involvement in the Mountaineers has grown exponentially through the years. Don's leadership abilities were quickly recognized and in 1980 he became chairperson of the Basic Climbing Committee. Subsequently, he has served in the position of Intermediate Climbing Committee chairperson, Banquet Chairman, and Branch Chair. He also provided invaluable support to the newsletter committee, instrumental in creating the newsletter's computerized format, and almost singlehandedly updated the branch's bylaws. Along the way, Don also found time to participate as a student of the Intermediate Climbing Course and the Telemark Course, from which he was the first graduate!

In the fall of 1989, Don was elected Everett branch trustee, a position that he filled for two years. The trustee position increased his involvement with the larger Mountaineer organization, leading first to his election to the Vice-Presidency and now PRESIDENT.

This election is a fitting recognition of a man known for his integrity, thoughtfulness, consideration of others, leadership abilities, and just plain "good sense". On behalf of the Everett Mountaineers, "THANK YOU, DON" and good luck in your new role.

APRIL'S PROGRAM

SPRING ACTIVITIES IN THE CASCADES

Rather than cleaning the yard on that beautiful spring day, spend it on the snow in the Cascades. With the days getting longer, cross-county skiing, snowshoeing and ski-mountaineering provides an opportunity to enjoy the serene beauty and solitude of the Cascades.

The slide presentation by David "Zap" Czaplicki will highlight the basics of each activity plus the availability of economical lodging. Zap is an avid winter enthusiast who spends over 50 days each winter in the mountains. Join Zap for a casual and humorous approach to spring activities in the Cascades.

MAY'S PROGRAM

A lot of Mountaineers have, at one time or another, fantasized about leaving their jobs, packing up their gear, and heading off to spend a whole summer exploring their "wish list" of favorite mountain areas. In 1990, one Everett branch member did just that. Over the course of the six months, he hiked, scrambled, or climbed in seven states, seven different National Parks, 12 wildemess areas, six major volcanic peaks, covering almost 800 miles on foot. The program following the May monthly meeting will feature his slides from these travels.

CLUB HOUSE FEASIBILITY STUDY

In mid 1991, Larry Longley, Branch Chair, created an Ad Hoc Committee to study the feasibility of acquiring a permanent clubhouse for the Everett Mountaineers. This committee was chaired by Forrest Clark, with George Swan as Secretary. Additional volunteers who contributed to the committee were Kevin Broderick, Jerry Campbell, Wayne Cunningham, Louis Coglas, Henry Krall, Seth Kelsey, Ray Metzer, Dennis Miller, Linda Nyman, and others.

The purpose of the committee was "to find a permanent facility where the Everett Mountaineers could hold classes, monthly meetings, store equipment, house a library and archives, and post pertinent club information to the general public. This would need to be acquired in such a way as to make the most prudent use of all Branch resources". A report to the Executive Committee was to be made on its findings and recommendations.

The committee investigated how other branches acquired facilities, looked at projected growth analysis (graphs enclosed), participated heavily in analyzing the Membership survey for direction from the membership, and reviewed where the members lived in relation to finding the ideal location geographically. The committee investigated the following options and made its report at the last Executive Committee meeting on February 19, 1992.

1) To purchase or build a club house using exiting funds.

Result: Insufficient funds available at this time.

2) To purchase or build a club house using exiting funds and borrowing money. Options such as increased dues, book sales, etc. were reviewed for feasibility.

Result: Insufficient cash flow to warrant this activity. There was also no interest from the survey of May 1991 for this option.

3) To build a shared club house facility as a joint venture with the Everett Parks Department and other similar organizations.

Result: Nothing available at this time. Might be pursued in the future.

4) To find an interested party/parties willing to donate land or capital for the building of a club house.

Result: No volunteers found at this time.

5) Find temporary office space and phone for a 6 month trial basis.

Result: Discussed at Executive Committee meeting.



EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE APPROVED THE FOLLOWING:

- 1) Propose a telephone system to provide convenient public access and availability.
- 2) The AD Hoc Feasibility Study Committee has completed its study and agrees to disband.
- 3) A new ongoing committee should assume the responsibility of continuing the work of the study committee.


The new committee should be named the Facilities Coordination Committee.


This new committee should be AD Hoc in nature, and serve in the capacity as advisory to the Everett branch.

CONSERVATION CORNER

An overwhelming majority of the Everett members endorsed the repairing of the Suiattle River road by the Forest Service. Louis Coglas asked for the club's approval. The greater the use of the forest for recerational purposes, the more aware people will be for the need to preserve this vanishing heritage of the Northwest.

Another vanishing heritage is the low-land old growth forest west of Bremerton known as the Rhododendrom Preserve. The Mountaineer Foundation manages this preserve of 180 acres.

In 1916, the Mountaineers purchased a 20 acre parcel containing a lodge called Kitsap Cabin and started a Forest Theater. In 1985 all but this 20 acres was transferred to the Mountaineer Foundation.

Adjoining acreage is now available and is needed as a buffer zone to protect and preserve the old growth trees and the wild natural habitat of plants, animals and spawning salmon in the streams.
