EARTH DAY ON THE CENTENNIAL TRAIL

That first Earth Day, staged by angry young men and women with the hopes of changing the earth back to a peaceful, just, and ecologically sustainable environment, saw the beginnings of a renewal in conservation ideals that have spread into mainstream American thinking. Although there still are marches and rallies reminiscent of those days today, many prefer to spend their energies working in other ways.

One of those ways has been the Centennial Trail on which the Everett Mountaineers have worked since its beginning. Every year we meet with other members of the trail coalition to work on trail cleanup. Some years it has been the removal of trees so that the trail can be seen. In other years it has been brushing the sides to make the trail wider.

This alert is from the Snohomish-Arlington Trail Coalition Newsletter. An action to establish ownership (quiet title action) has been filed against the County on a portion of the Centennial Trail immediately north of Hwy. 92 near Lake Stevens and Hartford. Ownership of this portion has always been questionable as this section was not available for purchase in the initial Quit Claim Deed from Burlington-Northem in 1990. To prevail, it must be shown that the area in question has been consistently used by the public since Burlington-Northern abandoned the railroad line in 1972. We need letters to the county from all persons who have used this section to establish that fact. If you have been a user of this section of the trail

EMR responds to all calls for SCVSR, but is specifically oriented towards rescues involving mountainous terrain; rocks and glaciers. These rescue conditions may involve climbers, hikers, airplane crashes and forest fires. Over the years myths have evolved and grown concerning those people in EMR and the function of EMR. We invite you to attend any of our regular monthly meetings to get the facts or even just to check-out monthly meetings to get the facts or even just to check-out whom would be there to rescue you. We promise you a "no frills, no pretense, just-the-way-we-are" meeting.

What we would really like is for you to consider joining EMR. If you do join, you will get a nifty decal to put on your car window, several phone calls in the middle of the night, good company and lots of bad jokes. Now about those myths:

- EMR is not a group of hot-shot rock climbers.
- No one is expected or required to respond to every call out.
- Being a member of the helicopter response team is a matter of choice-not a requirement.

The number of training sessions you attend is directly dependent upon the level of involvement you wish to make in EMR. The completion of the Mountaineers Basic Climbing Course or equivalent experience and MOFA is a requirement. The next meeting will be held on March 1, from 7:30 to 9:00 PM, at the Everett Yacht Club at 13th Street and Marine View Drive.

CLIMBING NEWS

MOFA REQUIREMENT CHANGED FOR CLIMB LEADERS

In the past all Everett climb leaders had to update their MOFA card every three years to remain on the leader list. After much thought and discussion, the Climbing Committee has decided to drop this requirement. We do, however, strongly advise all climb leaders to remain current with their first aid skills, either through self-study or by participating in a MOFA class.

Please note, this change does not apply to new climb leaders. Anyone desiring to become a basic or intermediate climb leader must have a current MOFA card at the time they petition the committee.

NEW 2-PULLEY METHOD BEING ADOPTED

This year's Basic Course will be taught a z-pulley method that is more closely in line with what is found in Freedom 5. This method utilizes a self-tending Bachmann knot. We will instruct the instructors at this year's Instructor Review. Details on the new system will be mailed out to all our instructors and leaders.

There are several benefits to adopting this new method. First, it provides a better, safer anchor system. Secondly, everyone is anchored throughout the whole process. Finally, this method encourages safe glacier travel techniques. So, read Freedom 5 to see the basic Z, watch your mailbox and carefully study the handout, and plan on coming to the Instructor review on March 20th at Stevens Pass.

CLIMBLINE

The Climbing Committee is sponsoring a climbline-an "announce only" voice mailbox which lists current climbing activities. This is intended to supplement the usual printed means of informing Everett climbers of current climbs. Now we have the ability to schedule climbs and get the word out after the deadline for the magazine. If you don't know already, here is how the system works:

Climbers: to find out about climbs call 348-7829. The recording will list the trip and the leader and his or her phone number. To sign up or get more info you will

have to call the leader.

CLIMBING FIELD TRIP INSTRUCTOR REVIEW

The annual Instructor Review Field Trip will be held on Saturday, March 20, 1993, 9:00 AM - 4:00 PM at Stevens Pass. In contrast to previous Instructor Review Field Trips, this year we will focus on snow climbing skills, including crevasse rescue, snow caves, and ice axe arrest. Attendance at this field trip is required for new field trip instructors and climb leaders. Current field trip instructors and climb leaders must attend an Instructor Review Field Trip at least every three years. Arrive early to allow time to find the group amid the skiers. We will meet in the upper parking lot, near the Mountaineers' lodge. Bring your skis to enjoy some night skiing after the field trip!

(Bring normal snowclimbing equipment.)

THE IRON GOAT TRAIL

There are over 500 "Rails to Trails" conversions in the United States. Whave 29 in the State of Washington alo. Our own Centennial Trail is one of those as is the Iron Goat trail near Stevens Pass. The "Iron Goat" name stems from Rocky the mountain goat on the Great Northern Railway's logo.

When the new Cascade Tunnel opened in 1929 the switchbacks, snowsheds, and tunnels constructed over the pass in the 1890's were abandoned by Burlington Northern. Pioneer access to the first phase of the trail (the Upper and Lower grades of the Martin Creek switchbacks) began in 1990 then proceeded to a staked-out survey by the end of 1991 and was followed by the necessary environmental analysis.

The actual construction began in the early Spring of 1992, with completion expected by October 2, 1993, 100 years from the completion of the original railroad. 281 volunteers from over two dozen organizations coordinated most prominently by VOW (Volunteers for Outdoor Washington) in partnership with the US Forest Service worked 3901 hours during 580 volunteer days in 1992.

In 1993 there are 50 work party dates planned starting with the crew leaders training session April 24 and closing the end of September. Work parties are scheduled on Wednesdays, Saturdays, and Sundays. There are generally 10 to 15 to a crew with a leader for each 5 or so members. The Mountaineer President's work party is scheduled for September 18 this year.

This is actual trail construction with tasks such as constructing wooden trestles, puncheon bridges, timber water bars, wood and rock retaining walls, spur trails and view points as well as grubbing.

It is an interesting and challenging project with immeasurable rewards. Work party assignments are arranged though monthly coordinators, contact the appropriate coordinator for the month in which you wish to volunteer.

Mountaineering Oriented First Aid MOFA is a first aid course specifically designed for those who may be in areas where 911 assistance is not readily available. A program that combines good basic first aid skills with experiential learning, MOFA is required for completion of many Mountaineer courses. The Everett Mountaineer MOFA committee works with the Everett Parks Department and the Everett Chapter of the American Red Cross to provide a comprehensive and useful course. Additionally, adult CPR certification is required to complete MOFA and that training is conveniently scheduled to coincide with the MOFA Course. There will be two sessions offered this Spring:

CONSERVATION CORNER

In January, I was invited to attend a meeting with the forest service biologists and other concerned conservation groups interested in the Mt.Baker-Snoqualmie Nation Forest. This was the result of the forest service's new approach of discussing issues with the public and interested groups. Most of the meeting revolved around the new access management plan that the forest service is trying to create. This would involve making a committee of interested parties such as snowmobilers, ORVers, hunters, hikers, bikers, conservationists, etc. This committee would be called "The Community of Interests". This group would then come together to discuss appropriate access management of roads and trails on a watershed basis. The forest service will then take the decision or options the group hashed out and consider them when deciding what to do with a road or trail as long as the decision is within the environmental laws and the N.E.P.A. (National Environmental Protection Act). The Forest Services hopes that this process will smooth out the many differences of opinion on how to manage roads and trails. This way of going about making decisions on the national forests may be a year or two down the road and many questions have to be answered, such as:


 Will there be a yearly review of the group and the process.

Who will be on the committee and how will they be picked.

How can it be on a watershed basis when animals and plants cross water shed lines.

 Will the committee be supplied with the proper biology information they need to make an informed decision.

These and many more questions will have to be answered but in the meantime keeping in contact and voicing our opinions are as important as ever. I plan to keep the Everett Mountaineers involved with this process so please help out and contact me with your opinions and questions on this or any subject.
