

LARRY LONGLEY RECEIVES DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

At the November Awards Banquet the 1993 Distinguished Service Award was presented to Larry Longley. Larry has been very active in the Everett Branch since he joined the Mountaineers in 1985. He has served on the Hiking committee for 4 years, the Conservation committee for 7 years, the Folkdance committee for 4 years, and had been very active on the Climbing committee from 1986 to 1990. While on the Climbing committee Larry served as lectures coordinator for the Basic climbing course and later as the climbs coordinator for 3 years. He also is the person responsible for writing both the Basic Climbs Guide and the Intermediate Climbs Guide that are used every year in both climbing courses. He is currently serving as the Basic Climbing Course Coordinator for this year's course. He was also on the Freedom 5 committee and helped in writing one of the chapters for the new 5th edition. Larry served as Branch Treasurer from 1987 to 1989 and was our Branch Chair from 1989 to 1991

Larry is most often thought of for the thousands of hours he spent coordinating the Mt. Pilchuck Lookout Restoration Project. It was Larry's initial idea to try to save the old lookout on top of Mt. Pilchuck that was scheduled to be burned in the next winter due to its deteriorated condition. Larry convinced the club to undertake a complete historical restoration of the lookout and managed to get the project se-lected as one of the State's Official Centennial Celebration projects. He did all of the historical research, fundraising, and coordinated the project with the many different agencies that ended up being involved in the project. Larry worked countless hours up at the lookout, along with Stan Koska who was the construction supervisor, and said he made 49 trips up to the lookout in one year. Last count, Larry says he has made 76 trips up Mt. Pilchuck. During Larry's tenure as Branch Chair he established a new standing committee as the Lookout and Trail Maintenance Committee, appointing Jerry Thompson to be the first chair of that committee. Now that Jerry has stepped down from chairing that committee it seems only reasonable that the current chair of the Lookout and Trail Maintenance Committee is Larry Longley. Maybe this is why Larry's mountaineer nickname is "Lookout Larry."

HELP STOP TRAILHEAD THEFT AND VANDALISM

On Saturday, August 14, 1993, seventeen different cars were broken into at trailheads in the Darrington Ranger District of the Mt. Baker Snoqualmie National Forest, with damages and losses totaling in excess \$6100. On another night nineteen other c were hit with damages and losses of over \$11,500.

These are our cars that are being vandalized. Hikers, backpackers, scramblers, climbers, snowshoers, skiers, nature lovers—we are all being victimized! It's time to start protecting our property!

This year the Everett Mountaineers and the United States Forest Service will begin building host campsites at the trailheads where this theft and vandalism has most occurred. After these campsites are completed, the Forest Service will draw from the Mountaineers, Volunteers for Outdoor Washington, Boeing Alpine Club, Search and Rescue, Boy Scouts, Sierra Club, Washington Alpine Club, and the Pilchuck Audubon Society, and hopefully others, for volunteers to act as trailhead hosts. It is hoped that this will deter the trailhead problems.

Campsites are to be built this year at Barlow Point, Whitechuck Trailhead, Suiattle Trailhead, and Bald Eagle Mountain Trailhead (at Sloan Creek). Construction dates will be:

GOLDEN TIMES OVER MONTE CRISTO

CHAPTER THREE Lake Byrne

With revegetation efforts having come to a successful and happy conclusion at Silver Lake above Monte Cristo in the fall of 1992, Jeff Leisy of the Forest Service's Darrington Ranger District suggested that a similar use of volunteers may be needed the following summer at Lake Byrne above Kennedy Hot Springs. Jeff, and later, Stacy Myers worked with the Everett Mountaineers' Lookout and Trail Maintenance Committee to make preliminary plans for a late summer weekend work party. Stacy, who returned to Darrington in the spring with a lovely tan after having spent several months working beneath the ozone hole in Antarctica, eventually turned over the specific planning of the Lake Byrne activity to Marty Pompermayer. Marty had several long conversations with Mountaineer Jerry Thompson and worked out the finest details of the activity. The work party was scheduled for August 28th and 29th. Thompson set about collecting a crew for those dates.

Marty, Stacy and other Forest Service people made several trips to the worksite mid-August. Significant work had alady been done and tools and materials

nad been carried to the site.

Marty went up to Lake Byrne on Wednesday, August 25th. Returning to the cabin at Kennedy Hot Springs in the evenings on Wednesday and Friday, he had carried up all of the cedar slats that were needed for check dams in the gully to

be revegetated.

Kim Dickey, Carrie Strandell, and George Swan, eager to become involved, went up to Lake Byrne on Thursday. They were joined by Marty Friday evening and started the Mountaineer portion of the effort in earnest. Many buckets of rocks were hand carried several hundred meters to the erosional gully that was the target of the weekend's activity. Marty and later other Forest Service personnel appreciated the skill and expertise of a professional stone mason in the person of Kim Dickey.

Stacy Myers met five Everett Mountaineers at the Whitechuck River Trailhead at 7:00 A.M. Saturday morning. Ginger Decker, Steve Pisek, and Jerry Thompson had come up Friday night and camped at the trailhead. Norm Buckley and Kris Maxwell had driven up Saturday morn-

Bundles of Curlex (a roll mat of excelor-like material used in covering and protecting revegetated areas) were cut and repacked. A couple of bundles of curlex (which was bulky but didn't weigh much) and a couple of tools (shovels and pulaskis)

made each Mountaineer's pack a sight to behold. Hikers and backpackers the group met stopped and stared in awe. Some

even took photographs.

The group arrived at Kennedy Hot Springs in two hours and took an extended break. The final two miles to Lake Byrne were steep and taxing compared to the five mile hike to the hot springs. A little over halfway, the trail wound out of deep forest into subalpine meadows. The group was passed here by a Seattle Mountaineer party of dayhikers led by Nelson Dow. They offered to help carry some of the tools the last threequarters of a mile to the lake. The climax to the hike to Lake Byrne is the new 'Stairway to Heaven" finished by Forest Service people earlier in the season.

As the rest of the crew arrived at the worksite, Kim Dickey was finishing the foundation work for the fifth of eleven steps in the gully that was the main target of the activity. The Saturday crew walked to a grassy campsite a bit over halfway down the east side of the lake. As tents were being set up, the sky turned dark and a squall line moved in. It began to rain and hail. There was thunder and lightning. Most everyone found shelter in their tents. Carrie Strandell left in the height of the storm because she had to be at work the next day.

As the storm let up, the crew drifted back to the worksite. Kim, Stacy, Marty, and George looked as if they had continued to work in the foul weather. Jerry launched an inflatable boat and began to ferry four bucket loads of rock to the worksite. Others tried to ignore him as he sang sea chanties and tried to fish on his trip across the lake. Work stopped at 6:00 P.M. as it started to rain again.

Back at the south campsite (Kim, George, and Kris camped closer to the worksite), the crew was joined by Jeff Leisy. Dinners were prepared and, as it grew darker, the atmosphere grew more festive. Steve Pisek provided the Jiffy-Pop. Stacy Myers made chocolate mousse. Marty Pompermayer contributed a cheesecake. Jeff Leisy provided brownies. Jeff and Jerry Thompson took turns making "Hot Snotties". People from the north camp visited the south camp and the party went on until about 9:30 P.M.

Norm Buckley was the first one to bed Saturday night and the first one up Sunday. The others soon followed. Backcountry ranger Katie Towson joined the crew. Work began fairly early. After getting a load of rocks from across the lake, Jerry rowed Norm to the south end of the lake to collect chinking rocks, to be used to fill spaces on the foundation rocks, so they could hold soil that would be added later. Jerry caught one fish on his first trip across the lake, and two more as he hauled the chinking rocks that Norm had collected. After two trips to the far

end of the lake, Jerry brought Norm back and they both helped the rest of the crew haul subsoil, then topsoil from borrow sites several hundred feet above, and over

a half mile from the worksite.

After the worksite had been covered with topsoil, plants brought down from the borrow sites were planted and watered. The site was then covered with curlex. Work was finished at 4:30 Sunday afternoon. Stacy and Jeff remained at the lake to work yet another day. Everyone else went back to their cars and were saying good-byes at eight o'clock Sunday evening. B.

PRESIDENT'S DAY WORK PARTY, 1993

Saturday, September 18, 1993, was the President's Day work party on the Iron Goat Trail. Three Everett Mountaineers attended - Don Heck (of course), Cindy Noon and George Swan. The Forest Ser-vice had left the last 1100 feet of the upper grade to be completed by the stalwart Mountaineers. This section was not easy. A major portion of the work involved digging out a ditch at least two feet wide, several feet deep and 50 feet long. There was much water seepage into the work area, which soon became a huge quagmire.

After considerable effort, the ditch started to take shape, except that at one end there was a huge sunken log that stopped water from draining. Many of the Seattle Mountaineers attacked the log. attempting to break it up, but as time went on each worker collapsed, exhausted, into the surrounding mud. Then came a voice, loud and clear-"Let me have a go!" It was the Mountaineers' indefatigable leader,

Don raised his pulaski high in the air and delivered a mighty blow to that log. At impact a huge jet of mud came back and splattered him in the face and chest. In a terribly loud voice, for all to hear, Don cried, "Aw, shucks!", or something simi-larly presidential. Somewhat aggrieved at this insult, Don started chopping away at the log with increased vigor. With every blow on that damned log another jet of mud came and decorated him. Finally, one giant blow split that log. From those watching a great cheer rang out, which could (so I am told) be heard all the way down in the Skykomish Ranger Station.
