1988 ALPINE SCRAMBLERS COURSE

Alpine Scrambles are unroped mountain climbs involving off-trail travel, often over rock and snow. The rugged terrain and exhilarating views of many Northwest summits are accessible by scramble routes. Though scrambles are generally less C difficult than technical climbs, many of the same destinations can be reached. Scrambling is a very popular activity. In addition to courses and workshops, the club sponsors over 200 scrambles every season. Safe scrambling calls for a degree of practical experience and proficiency in mountaineering skills. For that reason, only students and graduates of the Alpine Scrambles or Climbing Courses are allowed to participate in club scrambles. As in the past, the Everett Mountaineers, in cooperation with the Everett Parks and Recreation Department, is offering an Alpine Scrambles Course during 1988. We pride ourselves on providing quality instruction in an informal atmosphere for a reasonable price. Our course is open to all members of the Mountaineers and the public, age 16 and over (14 & 15 with adult). There are no formal prerequisites, however, prospective students are advised that all scrambles require good physicial conditioning, an ice axe, the ten essentials lug soled boots and a complement of other outdoor equipment. We teach equipment selection and use, navigation using map and compass, snow travel, ice axe arrest, avalanche and weather awareness, non-technical rock climbing, and wilderness ethics. Our goal is to teach the skills necessary to scramble enjoyably and safely with respect for the mountains. We do not teach roped rock techniques or glacier travel.

Mountain Oriented First Aid (MOFA) is required to graduate from the Alpine Scrambles Course. We recommend taking MOFA prior to the course.

This year's course will begin with an evening of lecture on March 1, 1988, held at Legion Hall in north Everett (see 1988 Basic Climbing Course description for directions). The rest of the course will be covered in two full days of lecture and practical experience, to be held in Everett's Forest Park over the weekend of March 12 and 13. Registration is through the City of Everett Parks and Recreation Department (259-0311); the fee is \$18.00 (\$15.00 for recertification). SPECIAL NOTE: This course does not provide training in CPR, also required for MOFA certification. Students are encourged to make arrangements as early as possible with the American Red Cross or with your local fire department to obtain CPR training and certification.
