EVERETT BRANCH HISTORICAL TRIVIA

I hope you enjoyed last month's trivia. To followup, the "Valley Pounders Award" was incorporated into the Lookout Peak as many of the destinations were the same.

This month's "Historical Trivia" is on The Everett Mountaineers' efforts to rename Goblin Peak to Kyes Peak.

Chairman Harold Sievers called the January 1947 meeting to order at the Everett Public Library Auditorium. During the meeting, the matter of renaming Goblin Peak, in the Monte Cristo District, after James Kyes was brought up. A letter from Congressman Jackson was read regarding this matter. Frank Elder proposed that it would be fitting for The Mountaineers to place a plaque on the summit in honor of James Kyes.

In September 1947, Harold Sievers received a letter from Washington D.C. stating that Goblin Peak is now officially Kyes Peak. John Lehman reported on the climb to Kyes Peak. In spite of bad weather, a dedication was made by C. O. Davis, with remarks and a flag in memory of James Kyes. Mr. Lehman also stated a bronze plaque had been ordered for the dedication ceremony but it had been broken when finishing it and a replacement had not arrived in time for the ceremony. Since the cost of the plaque would be between \$25 and \$30 and because a similiar article has been destoried in the past, it was decided to drop the matter of placing a plaque on Kyes Peak. It was decided that a flag be placed on the peak on each climb. A piece of tin with James Kyes signature had been found and would be placed in one of the lodges as a proper and fitting memorial.

1988 ALPINE SCRAMBLERS COURSEALPINE SCRAMBLES

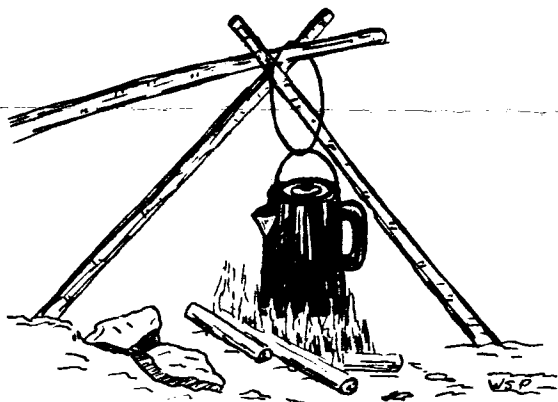
Alpine Scrambles are non-technical mountain climbs that involve offtrail travel on either rock or snow. Though scrambles are generally less difficult than technical climbs, many of the same destinations can be reached.

The main difference between a scramble and a climb is the use of ropes. Scramblers do not travel on glaciers, exposed rock, or other places where ropes are required.

Scrambling calls for a degree of practical experience and proficiency in mountaineering skills. For that reason, only students and graduates of the Alpine Scrambles or Climbing Courses are allowed to participate in Club scrambles.

The Everett Branch offers scrambles training beginning April 14th. The course includes five lectures and three field trips for \$25. See the January 1988 issue of the Branch newsletter for details about the course and the course schedule.
