# Mt. Pilchuck Lookout Seeks Contributions

The Everett Branch, in cooperation with Washington State Parks and the U.S. Forest Service, is undertaking the complete restoration of the Mt. Pilchuck Lookout this year. In addition to restoring the structure to its original condition, we will be designing, building and installing interpretive displays within the lookout itself. These displays will include:

- 1. a history of the Mt. Pilchuck lookout;
- environmental education concerning proper trail use and minimum impact camping;
- 3. a photographic display identifying the surrounding peaks and landmarks seen from the lookout;
- 4. a display thanking the various agencies, donors, and sponsors of the project;
- 5. a brochure to be given out at selected locations, describing the history of Mt. Pilchuck and information about what can be found at the restored lookout.

Once the lookout has been restored, it will qualify for consideration on the National Historic Register and we hope to have it recognized as a National Historic Site. The project has already been selected to be a part of the 1989 Washington Centennial Celebration for this next

As a part of that celebration, Snohomish County has awarded us a \$1,000 grant toward the cost of restoration. Our project was one of seven finalists for the county's grant funding of \$7,500. However, we estimate that we will need an additional \$6,000 worth of materials to complete the restoration and displays.

We are therefore asking individual Branch members to consider donating either personal time, materials or money toward the successful completion of the project. Below is a partial list of materials needed. Following that is a time line projection of logistics from now until project completion.

Remember, too, that the Everett Branch is continuing its work on the Three Fingers Lookout Restoration Project this summer. Materials and labor is needed for that project as well.

# TIME LINE PROJECTIONS

Starting Month & Description

Begin construction of interpretive displays. Finalize content and format of brochures. Purchase materials.

Organize transport of materials to site. Finalize electrical grounding at lookout. Print brochures. Finish construction of displays. Paint new windows and door.

Restore foundation under lookout. Replace structural joists under floor. Reopen south and west walls. Repair structural members in north and east walls. Replace siding as needed. Install new window frames. Repair roof. Repair floor. Install windows and doors. Replace catwalk and railings.


Paint entire lookout structure. Install interpretive displays.

# June

Install permanent register book for guests. Distribute brochures. Finalize any remaining loose ends.

July

Finished and ready for guests.

#### 1989 Alpine Scramble Course

If you enjoy the mountains, but aren't quite ready for roped climbing, Alpine Scrambles is the activity for you. Scrambling is the middle ground between hiking and climbing. It is ascending mountains, usually over rock or snow routes, but nothing that requires roping up. Believe it or not, many rugged summits can be reached by scramble routes.

Now is the time to sign up for our 1989 scramble course. We provide quality instruction in a fun, informal atmosphere, at a reasonable price.

We teach equipment selection and use, navigation using map and compass, snow travel, ice axe arrest, avalanche and weather awareness, non-technical rock climbing, and wilderness ethics. We teach the skills necessary to scramble enjoyably and safely with respect for the mountains. We do not teach roped rock techniques, glacier travel or use of crampons.

Mountaineering Oriented First Aid (MOFA) is required to graduate from the Scrambles program. For your convenience, we have scheduled our course around the MOFA training in Everett.

Advance enrollment is recommended since class size is limited. To enroll, or for information about scrambles or the scrambles course, contact Dennis Miller or any member of the Scrambles Committee listed in the January Newsletter.
