



Rules for Identifying

- One bird at a time
- Identify a bird to a broad category
 - Then narrow to a smaller group, then to species
- Look for 3 or more clues to identify the bird
- Remember everyone makes mistakes, that is okay, learn from them.




Scientific Name


- Genius & species makes the scientific names.
 - Buteo jamaicensis Red-tailed Hawk
 - Accipiter striatus Sharp-shinned Hawk
 - Falco columbarius Merlin
 - Circus hudsonius Northern Harrier

Group of birds that are related are in the same genius, the next higher level is the family level, and they are related at the next higher level. Many characteristics are similar for members of the same genius.






Proportions

Posture




Wing Shape

- Rounded or pointed at tip
- Emarginated
- Broad or Narrow
- Short or long



Wing Shape – look at how it varies

Notched/square/rounded/pointed tip





Head&body ≤ Wing length = Tail
Short wings, long tail

Raptor Category	Wing Length	Wind Width	Wing Shape	Tail Length
Vultures	Long	Broad	Rounded	Short
Eagles	Long	Broad	Rounded	Short
Buteos	Moderately Long	Broad	Rounded	Long
Accipters	Short	Broad	Rounded	Long
Falcons	Long	Narrow	Pointed	Long
Harriers	Long	Narrow	Rounded	Long









Flight Style

- Soaring
 - Flat, Bent, Dihedral
 - Long or Flap & Soar
 - Power flight (Falcons)
 - Flap, flap, glide (Red-tailed Hawk & Accipiters
 - Glide, flap, glide (Northern Harrier)
- Direct Flight
- Hovering





