# **Quick Hits**

- Save the Date! This year's <u>Leadership Conference</u> is scheduled for Saturday, December 1. Registration opens September 17!
- Speak up for the Enchantments. One of Washington State's most coveted wild places could be impacted by a wide-ranging water management proposal called the Icicle Creek Strategy. The plan calls for new, enlarged dams, which could flood nearby trails and campsites. It also raises concerns about appropriate actions in a protected wilderness area. We encourage you to learn more about the proposal and use the public comment period to make your voice heard here.
- **Outdoor CEO Diversity Pledge.** When Teresa Baker, the founder of African American Nature and Parks Experience, asked The Mountaineers to sign on to her <u>Diversity Pledge</u>, our CEO Tom Vogl jumped on board because "...everyone has the right to have amazing experiences in our wild places." In <u>this article</u> from SNEWS, Teresa Baker explains that diversity is also critical for conservation.
- The importance of turnaround times. On a recent climb of Mt. Rainier, volunteer climb leader Liana Robertshaw was faced with a tough decision: push on past the agreed upon turnaround time, or end the summit attempt for a team of climbers. <u>Read more</u>.
- Wildfire safety. Wildfires are going to become bigger and more frequent in the future. If you find yourself caught in one, <u>this</u> is what you need to do.
- **Outdoor recreation study.** Have you ever made the trip to Bozeman, MT to climb ice in Hyalite Canyon? Our friends at the Outdoor Alliance are gathering information about the economic impact of outdoor recreation on the national forest around Bozeman. If you've climbed in Hyalite (or otherwise recreated on the Custer Gallatin), you can help. Take the <u>survey</u> today!
- **People of color in the outdoors.** "When I slip into my spot around the bonfire they are the people to my right and left. I trust them with my life. I enjoy their company. But there's this dividing line of things we don't talk about. After all, the social issues that weigh on me and affect my community are also the very things they come to the outdoors to ignore." <u>Read more</u>.
- Keep it clean. Even if the soap bottle is labeled biodegradable, natural, or organic, it's still bad.
- Easy peasy transportation. On weekends and designated holidays, <u>Trailhead</u> <u>Direct</u> takes riders to three hiking destinations: Mount Si, Issaquah Alps, and Mailbox Peak. All buses are run by King County and regular fares apply, just like in the city. By establishing this service, Trailhead Direct aims to increase accessibility

to local trails, limit vehicle congestion in trailhead parking lots, and reduce carbon emissions. If you have a group of more than 10 people - for example, for a Mountaineers activity - please fill out <u>this form</u> to reserve seating.
