Thank you for your ongoing commitment to our programs!





Access & Permits: State Parks

This month, we're highlighting the permit process with Washington State Parks. The Mountaineers holds a Commercial Use Permit with Washington State Parks, and the <u>permit document</u> is available on every State Parks route/place in our database for leaders to download and bring on their trips (in print or electronic format). This particular permit is somewhat unique in that all of our organization's use, whether it is course-related or standalone, is treated identically by the land manager. Staff reports on our actual usage to State Parks at the end of the calendar year, and we are charged a flat fee per individual, per use day, for all Mountaineers activities that take place on State Park land.

Additionally, we're thrilled to share that the <u>Simplifying Outdoor Access for Recreation</u> (<u>SOAR</u>) <u>Act</u>, a bipartisan piece of legislation we've worked on for nearly six years, has been introduced in the U.S. Senate. When passed, it will be easier for more people to experience public lands through outdoor programs by improving recreational permitting systems on federal lands.



Lessons Learned: Bear Awareness

Washington is bear country, and as we transition to longer summer days - and overnights - in the backcountry, it's essential to refresh our bear awareness skills. Our friends at Defenders of Wildlife offer a <u>great presentation</u> about bear biology, how to differentiate between black bears and grizzlies (they do exist in Washington!), and important bear awareness tips.

Leader Logistics: Essential Eligibility Criteria (EEC) & Service Animal Policy

The Mountaineers values diversity – including persons with diverse abilities – in our programs. While we do not specialize in integrating persons with disabilities into our programs, we encourage people of all abilities to consider participating in Mountaineers programming.

Earlier this month, The Mountaineers Board of Directors approved our new <u>Essential</u> <u>Eligibility Criteria (EEC)</u> and a <u>Service Animal Policy</u>. These documents are designed to help prospective participants navigate their ability to participate in our programs, and to provide a framework for leaders to assess requests for accommodation.

We encourage all leaders to view this <u>9-minute narrated presentation</u> for a more in-depth overview of how both our Essential Eligibility Criteria and Service Animal Policy are designed to support our programs, leaders, and participants.
