Lessons Learned: The Fall Looked Minor

Falls can be unavoidable. Despite the best of planning and an abundance of caution, the outdoors is an unpredictable environment and accidents will inevitably happen. Even minor falls can lead to major injuries, which is why a variety of scenario-based training is critical to leader development. One leader shares their experience working with a team to successfully manage an incident on their snowshoe trip.

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Access & Permits: Cle Elum Ranger District

The Mountaineers operate under a Priority Use Permit with the <u>Cle Elum Ranger District</u> of the Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest. At the end of each year, we report our actual paid (course-related) usage on land within this Ranger District and submit an operating plan

detailing our proposed usage for the upcoming year. To ensure that our operating plan reflects our usage as accurately as possible, it is important that leaders notify us if you are planning a *new* course in the Cle Elum Ranger District, or if you plan to significantly *increase* the size of a course or field trip you have offered in the past. Leader Logistics: No Shows vs Cancellations

When <u>closing your trip roster</u>, you'll notice that there are several different options under the Participant Result. What is the difference between a No Show and a Cancellation? The Mountaineers does not have any specific No Show policy, but generally speaking, activity participants are marked as a No Show if they do not provide any advanced notice of their cancellation. Setting the Participant Result to No Show triggers an automatic email to that person reminding them to <u>practice good cancellation etiquette</u>. And while No Shows don't mean a participant will be blocked from attending future trips, leaders may take a history of No Shows into consideration if they've required Leader Permission to attend their trip.
