



STEWARDSHIP TO CONSERVATION ADVOCACY

\Rightarrow

Conservation Education

Create awareness and buy-in through Backcountry Impact Series presentations, focusing on Leave No Trace skills specific to climbing in Washington State and highlighting the value of stewardship.

Goal number of people reached: 200

Stewardship

Promote six stewardship days at local climbing areas, making the course's stewardship requirement easier and more relevant for students to fulfill, and furthering the connections between recreational experiences and conservation.

Goal numbers: 75% of students complete their stewardship requirement

Conservation Advocacy

Introduce specific issues and avenues to implement climbing-related advocacy. This would be done primary through email communications, leveraging the engagement organizing model.

Goal: Introduce students to specific conservation advocacy issues. Engage a core number of individuals (1-5) to take the lead on issues and give them the tools to continue to advocate for conservation issues in the future.
